

Foundation Realizes Double-Digit Growth in Annual Giving

A seventeen percent increase in annual giving to the Northern Maine Community College Foundation over the past year is a reflection of the work of the institution throughout the region and the positive impact of the College on the lives of its students and in the communities it serves.

That was the message shared with the over 100 donors and friends of the NMCC Foundation gathered at the College on November 4 for the organization's annual dinner and meeting. The event, which served as a celebration of a successful year for the Foundation, featured remarks from a halfdozen NMCC students who are recipients of scholarship funds awarded by the organization. Honors were also presented to key leaders, donors and volunteers who have been instrumental in moving the Foundation and College forward.

Highlights of the past year noted during the annual meeting included the receipt by the Foundation of a \$20,000 anonymous gift. Half of the donation was directed to establish an endowed scholarship for students enrolled in nursing and allied health programs. The other \$10,000 was used, at the request of the donors, to create an endowed emergency fund to help NMCC students in the greatest need.

The work of the newly established NMCC Alumni and Friends Organization was also recognized. The NMCC Foundation played a critical role in getting the group off the ground.

18 NMCC Employees Reach Milestones

"The devotion and dedication of our employees is extraordinary and important for us to celebrate. As this year's employee recognition ceremony demonstrates, people who come to work here tend to stay," said NMCC President Timothy Crowley during the annual employee recognition luncheon which was held in October this year.
