New nurses celebrate entry into profession at NMCC pinning ceremony

Aroostook County - The healthcare profession welcomed 43 prospective new registered nurses recently as Northern Maine Community College held its annual pinning ceremony, which signifies the official entrance into the nursing field for members of the graduating class. The graduates are now eligible and prepared to sit for the NCLEX-RN examination to obtain licensure as registered nurses.

Approximately 400 family members, friends and college personnel gathered for the ceremony held at the Presque Isle Middle School. The highlight of the event was the presentation of a pin to each graduate by relatives or close friends who were selected for their important role as members of the student nurse's support network.

Dr. Kimberly Esquibel, chair of the college's nursing and allied health department, reflected on the beginnings of the class, their first semester, first clinical rotation, first nursing care plan, and many other "firsts" experienced together. She noted that they are now embarking on a series of new firsts and hoped that the shared wisdom from their faculty would serve them well.

"Never lose sight of the fact that taking care of patients and their families is a privilege. Be life-long learners, work as a team, be encouraging to nursing students just as others have supported you," she advised. "Nursing is all about heart."

This sentiment was reinforced by NMCC President Timothy Crowley.

"You have the technical skills you need. The faculty has prepared you well. Commitment to your profession and to your patients is what it is all about now," he told the nursing seniors, urging them to take their Nightingale Pledge which they would be reciting during the ceremony to heart.

The guest speaker for the pinning ceremony was Paula Michaud, a nurse who works in the operating room at The Aroostook Medical Center. She shared the story of a patient's family that underscored the role that nurses play in support in times of trial and joy.

"It's a privilege to be a nurse. It should never be taken lightly. Be an advocate; you are their voice when they don't have one. Each person you treat is loved by someone. They are counting on you to help them," she told the nursing graduates. "Congratulations on becoming part of our team."
