Breaking the Mold

When Elmer Whittaker came to NMCC last year to help his stepson apply for college, he wasn't planning on completing an application for himself. An NMCC alumni from Presque Isle, Elmer had already earned an Associate in Applied Science degree in Automotive Technology 15 years ago. However, after speaking with staff and learning about the Health Information Technology (HIT) program offered at NMCC, Elmer decided to return to college.

Before choosing a program, Elmer had to carefully review all of his options, taking his age and health into consideration and choosing a career that he would be physically able to do. "I chose HIT because it is not as physically demanding on the body as other professions are." Elmer describes HIT as being a challenging program. "Being an older student and being removed from school for so long, I have to put extra work into it." Elmer has been able to apply what he is learning in his classes to his personal



life, whether it's participating in conversations with his family about health-related topics or while caring for his ill sister. Elmer shares his secrets for success. "You need to have a basic routine, develop a schedule, and do your assignments regularly."

Elmer also offers advice for males considering a career in HIT. "Don't let your gender be the deciding factor for doing the program. It doesn't matter."
