## Harding Announces \$1 Million Gift to NMCC

At a dedication ceremony for a new gazebo erected on the NMCC campus in memory of his late wife, B. Jean Harding, Presque Isle attorney Floyd Harding announced a \$1 million gift to NMCC – the largest individual private contribution received to date by a Community College in the state or any institution of higher education in northern Maine.

The charitable remainder trust, established through the NMCC Foundation as part of the *Campaign for the County's College*, will benefit student scholarships, specifically the Jean and Floyd Harding Scholarship Fund. College officials anticipate more than 150 deserving NMCC students will receive financial assistance annually as a result of the gift.

"One day, in fact for many days, these people who are benefiting from the Jean and Floyd Harding Scholarship Fund may well ask: 'Who was that Jean and Floyd Harding anyway?' On this day I would tell you that I hope they would know that we were two people that tried to give love and hope to both the old and the young," said Harding immediately after announcing the donation.

The announcement was met with applause by the NMCC faculty, staff and students, state and local political leaders, dozens of family members and many friends of Floyd and (the late) Jean Harding who gathered for the dedication ceremony.

"Floyd and Jean were an outstanding couple. As I have gotten to know Floyd, I have been amazed at the history he has lived and the contributions he has made. He has met presidents and leaders. He has given to his community in many ways," said NMCC

President Timothy Crowley. "The donation to the college is very significant and it will help hundreds for years to come. It is his commitment to his fellow human beings that we should be most impressed with. The people of the County will be forever in Floyd and Jean Harding's debt. We are grateful and humbled by your generosity."

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## **Constitution Day to Be Celebrated; Community Invited**

Monday, September 17, will mark the 220th anniversary of the signing of the U.S. Constitution. To mark the occasion students and employees at NMCC have planned an afternoon of

events and are inviting community members to join in the celebration.

Constitution Day is an American federal holiday that recognizes the ratification of the U.S. Constitution on September 17, 1787. Festivities to mark the occasion are planned throughout the country.

The Aroostook

County celebration at NMCC will begin at 2:00 p.m. in the College library located in the E. Perrin Edmunds building. Members of the Aroostook County Veterans of Foreign Wars color guard, led by well-know Veteran Peter Miesburger of Caribou will present the colors to start the celebration, while NMCC student Alysa Snow performs the national anthem.

Following the opening ceremony, David Raymond, NMCC arts and sciences faculty member, will deliver a presentation on the changing views of the Constitution through history.

"Despite our veneration of the Constitution, it is useful to remember that it has not always been celebrated as the culmination of a great democratic revolution. Some historians have viewed it as an undemocratic document that was devised to thwart the will of the people. Was the Constitution the result of economic conflict or democratic consensus? In my presentation I will try to sort through the varying interpretations by providing a brief overview of the shifting views of the Constitution held by American historians," said Raymond.

Following Raymond's presentation, NMCC student activities will host a Community Constitution Day reception featuring red, white and blue refreshments in the lobby of the Edmunds Conference Center.

At 3:00 p.m., student activities will sponsor a College Constitution Jeopardy contest in the Edmunds Confer-

the September 17 event, the College library will mark Constitu-

tion Day with an exhibit of books in the College collection that are listed as "banned books." The books that have been challenged on the national level by one group or another will be on display through the week of September 29 through October 6, which has been designated by the American Library Association as Banned Books Week.

The law establishing Constitution Day was enacted in 2004 with the passage of an amendment by Senator Robert Byrd (D-West Virginia) to the Omnibus spending bill of that year. Before this law was passed the holiday was known as Citizenship Day. The act mandates that all publicly funded educational institutions provide educational programming on the history of the American Constitution on that day or an adjacent weekday.

# Snowe & Collins Champion Proposed Bill that Includes \$150,000 for NMCC

Students and faculty in NMCC's nursing and allied health programs, as well as hospitals and healthcare organizations throughout Aroostook County, stand to benefit from a proposed \$150,000 in federal funding championed by U.S. Senators Olympia Snowe and Susan Collins.

The money, which is included in the fiscal year 2008 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education spending bill as reported by the Senate Appropriations Committee, is designated to support the establishment of the Northern Maine Allied Health Education and Training Center on the NMCC campus.

"We are most grateful to Senators Snowe and Collins and members of their respective staffs who stood behind us on this initial request for federal dollars to support the College and this project in particular," said NMCC President Timothy Crowley. "The need for expansion in the allied health related fields here in northern Maine is critical. We are pleased that our congressional delegation recognizes and has pledged their continued support behind this important initiative." "I am pleased to support the effort to establish the Northern Maine Allied Health Education and Training Center at the Northern Maine Community College," said Senator Collins. "Like many other states, Maine faces a nursing shortage of critical proportions. I am hopeful that this center would help address that need and allow even more students to follow their dreams of a career in medicine."

"This is great news for Northern Maine Community College and the many students who will directly benefit from this funding," said Senator Snowe. "The Northern Maine Allied Health Education and Training Center will provide greater access to technology, training equipment, and enhanced classrooms to help students develop their skills. By providing students with these top-notch resources, we are giving them the tools they need to advance in the future."

The appropriations bill which includes the funding for NM will now go to the full Senate. If approved, the plan is to establish a temporary space in the existing nursing and allied health instruction area that would allow faculty and students to use the new equipment immediately.

## **Foundation to Sponsor Fall & Winter Sports & Recreation Show**

"With the burgeoning interest in fall and winter sports and recreation here in the County, and growing importance of the winter season to the region's economy, and the numerous opportunities it provides to visitors and locals alike, an event of this kind is greatly needed," said Angela Berry-Thompkins show coordinator.

Exhibitors participating in the show are expected to include representatives from the snowmobile and ATV recreation sector, including area retail dealers, local clubs and other organizations that benefit from the industries. Also taking part will be organizations and business that cater to other fall and winter sports including hunting, cross-country and alpine skiing, biathlon, snowshoeing and ice fishing to name a few.

Organizers are also turning to other businesses in Aroostook County and neighboring Western New Brunswick who cater to individuals who are looking for alternative ways to pass the long winter season. For example, Gene's Electronics will be displaying their satellite system.

Some special displays of interest will include the trail groomer used by the Presque Isle Snowmobile Club, Can Am Crown video and souvenirs, a special needs sled used by Fort Kent Sno-Riders to give snowmobile rids to handicapped/ special needs individuals. Aroostook County Tourism will also be displaying a new GPS trail system, which covers 2200 miles of trails.

For those who want to get a little more 'hands-on', Presque Isle Minor Hockey will have a net set up and a radar gun to record the speed of people taking shots.

Show attendees are also invited to have a ride in a humvee, courtesy of the Maine Military Authority.

Also, NMCC senior nursing students will be holding their annual health fair during the event, focusing on topics of the season. Topics will include: prevention and treatments of both frostbite and hypothermia; stress management/coping strategies; common winter illnesses; Seasonal Affective Disorder; winter sports safety; benefits of activity; and energy/nurtrition and exercise.

Because of the wide variety of business, topics and displays being represented, Berry-Thompkins sees the show as an event that will have something of interest for the entire family.

"We are certain the diversity of exhibitors will reflect the myriad of things available for residents and visitors to our part of the world at this busy time of year," said Berry Thompkins.

The 2007 County Fall and Winter Sports and Recreation Show will be held on September 29 from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and on Sunday, September 30 between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

the driving forces and member of an ad hoc committee established to bring, what was referred to at the time as, vocational education to Aroostook County.

As a result of the group's efforts and those of area legislators, including Representatives Harold Stewart and Senator E. Perrin Edmunds, a bill was passed in 1961 to establish the Northeastern Maine Vocational Institute, a forerunner of NMCC.

Harding, a respected attorney and former State Senator who was elected to three terms in the Maine State Senate, has long been known as a leader and activist in the Democratic Party, having served as chair of both the Presque Isle and Aroostook County Democratic Committees and as an advisor and campaigner for numerous elected officials.

A native of central Maine and one of twelve children, Harding grew up on a dairy farm before attending Colby College in Waterville in 1941, where he earned his first degree. In 1949, he graduated from Boston University Law School and subsequently passed the Maine and Massachusetts bar entry exams.

"For me, this is also payback because anonymous people made a contribution to Colby College that made it possible for me to attend that wonderful school. The generosity of those wonderful benefactors has made it possible for me to better serve my community, county, state and nation," said Harding.

Between his years at Colby and Boston University, Harding served in the United States Armed Forces during World War II in Europe. In the early days of the Battle of the Bulge, he was captured by the Germans and became a prisoner of war. During his internment, he was held in Dresden and was present during the fire bombings of the German city.

He first came to the County in 1950 to work as Maine Potato Grower's credit manager and assistant general counsel. After working for MPG for four years, he established a private law practice and began a life of civic involvement and leadership.

In 1950, Harding became a charter member of the Presque Isle Kiwanis Club. He was elected president in 1957 and is still an active member today. He served on the board of directors of the Presque Isle hospital for many years, including serving as its president from 1963 through 1964.

Another organization benefiting from his involvement is the Presque Isle Chamber of Commerce, of which Harding has been a member since starting his law practice, serving as president in 1958. He has also been involved in raising funds for his church, Grant Memorial Methodist.

## **B. Jean Harding Gazebo Dedicated**



State Senator John L. Martin served as master of ceremonies during the August 24 gazebo dedication at NMCC.

This gazebo built by NMCC residential construction students in May has been placed on campus and officially dedicated in honor and memory of B. Jean Harding during a ceremony held at the College. The legacy of the first woman elected to the Presque Isle City Council, who remains the longest serving individual ever to hold the post, was remembered at NMCC on August 24, as the institution officially dedicated a gazebo in honor and memory of B. Jean Harding.

State and local leaders, community members, as well as family and friends of Floyd and Jean Harding joined with NMCC faculty, staff and students to pay tribute to the woman who made her mark at the college and in her community.

"We are here today to celebrate the life and countless contributions of a woman who gave selflessly to her community, county, state and country. So many of us here today – certainly all of us at NMCC – owe a debt of gratitude to this staunch advocate, supporter and friend. The evidence of her drive and dedication, her very passion to help others better their lives, and her compassion for her fellow man, woman and all living things is very visible all around us," said NMCC President Timothy Crowley.

Crowley's comments were followed by other distinguished speakers, who included State Senator John Martin, who served as master of ceremonies; Maine State Chamber of Commerce President Dana Connors, a former Presque Isle City manager who worked closely with Jean Harding and who delivered the keynote address at the dedication ceremony; Daniel Donovan, Jean Harding's son, who spoke on behalf of the family; and Floyd Harding himself.

A recurring theme in the presentations was the appropriateness of the structure that was constructed by the NMCC residential construction class of 2007, faculty member Guy Jackson and his lab assistant Nathan Gardiner. The physical location of the gazebo was also noted as fitting.



"You needn't look far in this city, or from this very spot, to find the beneficiaries of her decades of service and civic engagement. The bike path, which encircles Presque Isle and passes here just behind me; the

Sister Mary O'Donnell Homeless Shelter and Central Aroostook Humane Society – around the corner; and this fine College, the shadow of which we sit this afternoon, are but a few examples of my mother's passionate advocacy for the people of this area," said Donovan in tribute to his mother.

The 12 foot wide octagonal shaped gazebo and surrounding landscaping were constructed and planted to resemble that on the Presque Isle Hillside Street property on which Jean Harding enjoyed spending time working and relaxing. A marker by the gazebo, which was unveiled at the end of the dedication ceremony, encapsulates Jean Harding's achievements.

"It is fitting that this gazebo be dedicated in her honor, surrounded by flowers that she so loved and the opportunity for people to gather here and chat about nothing of importance except the importance of love and friendship. It is also fitting that this gazebo sit just yards away, and in view of the bike path she advocated for, and what became one of the jewels in her crown of nearly two decades of service as an elected official in this city," said Harding in his remarks.

In his remarks, Dana Connors spoke about how effective Jean was at being the 'voice of the people of Presque Isle.'

"I'm proud to be a part of this special moment that celebrates the life of a woman who showed so much love for the people she served. Jean was not only an inspiration in her dedicated service as an elected official and a community advocate, she was the most caring public servant I have ever had the pleasure to work with. She cared, with unparalleled passion, for the people of this area," said Connors.

Jean Harding served a total of 18 years on the Presque Isle City Council in the 1970's and 1980's. During her tenure she worked tirelessly on numerous issues and committees, including as a staunch advocate for the city's recreation department and in support of the Presque Isle Industrial Council in their efforts to secure new business for the community.

She also represented the city on various county and state committees, including serving on the Aroostook Finance Committee and working with the Maine Municipal Association on behalf of the City of Presque Isle.

Aside from her work in city government and her advocacy on behalf of

NMCC and its forerunners Northern Maine Technical College and Northern Maine Vocational Technical Institute, Jean Harding was actively engaged in numerous civic organizations and fundraising initiatives.

She worked side-by-side with Sister Mary O'Donnell to secure funds for the County's only homeless shelter and with other community volunteers to establish the Central Aroostook Humane Society's animal shelter. In addition Harding worked to support the efforts of the Opportunity Training Center in the Star City.

Jean Harding also worked to raise funds for several groups, including the Maine Veteran's Home in Caribou and area cancer support organizations, and she was an instrumental force in raising funds to rebuild the Grant Memorial United Methodist Church in Presque Isle after it was destroyed by fire more than a decade ago.

Amongst all of her civic and community involvement, Jean Harding and her husband Floyd together raised nine children.



The ceremony included two musical selections, chosen by Floyd because of their special significance to his late wife. "The Green, Green Grass of Home," was performed acoustically by Aimee Wilkins, a 2007 NMCC graduate, and her husband Bruce (left). The second selection, "Amazing Grace," was performed as a vocal musical interlude by 2007 Aroostook Idol winner Annie Charles (above) of Limestone, who was accompanied by the Wilkins.

## **Houlton Regional Hospital Pledges \$45,000** to Support Nursing Program



Houlton Regional Hospital has committed \$45,000 over the next three years to support the nursing program offered by NMCC in southern Aroostook County. The funds, committed to NMCC's Campaign for the County's College, are designated to support the nursing courses delivered by NMCC via distance technology at the Houlton Higher Education Center.

"Houlton Regional Hospital is pleased to collaborate with NMCC and the nursing program at the Houlton Higher Education Center. This is a tremendous opportunity for Houlton area residents to attend their nursing classes locally and to do their clinical rotation at HRH. This also provides the hospital with potential employees and for graduates to work near their homes," said Thomas Moakler, CEO of Houlton Regional Hospital. "NMCC is a great community college and the Houlton community has certainly benefited from their presence here."

In May, the students currently enrolled in the NMCC nursing program in Houlton completed the first year of the extensive two-year degree program. After successfully completing all courses, they will earn their associate in science degree and be eligible to take the NCLEX-RN national licensure exam. Upon successful completion of the exam, they are able to apply for licensure in Maine and/or any other state.

As part of their educational experience,

the students train in a variety of clinical settings, including many learning opportunities at Houlton Regional Hospital.

"We have been very fortunate to work cooperatively with Houlton Regional Hospital in the delivery of our nursing program in southern Aroostook and are so pleased that the hospital has made this key contribution to support the program," said Timothy Crowley, NMCC president. "Tom Moakler and his entire staff have been great resources and partners in our efforts to expand allied health education offerings in the greater Houlton area. This contribution underscores their commitment, not only to nursing education, but to the people of the region.

NMCC initially ran a pilot program for providing distance education in nursing, working with HRH, a few years ago. That effort has been extended with the current cohort of student nurses

HRH employs over 425 people and serves a wide geographic area with a population of approximately 17,000 people. The hospital is licensed for 25 acute beds and 28 skilled nursing/nursing home beds. Services are typical of those of an acute care hospital and include a 24 hour physician covered emergency room, comprehensive medical/surgical services and a multitude of out-patient services, including pulmonary and cardiac rehabilitation, physical, occupational and speech therapy to name a few.

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## MMG Makes Largest Corporate Donation to Date

The KeyBank commitment to the Campaign for the County's College was designated evenly between the Investing in Innovation Fund, a technology endowment fund to purchase instructional technology for college academic programs, and the College and Community Advancement Fund, which will provide an immediate source of funding to allow NMCC to launch new curricula and respond promptly to evolving community need.

'KeyBank's contribution to both the instructional technology endowment and the community advancement fund will provide valuable assistance in our delivery of academic programs and ongoing efforts to meet the needs of expanding and new businesses in the County. It will ensure that our students continue to train on and work with the technology that employers in our region expect and require, as well as assist with our efforts to support the region's economic development," said NMCC President Timothy Crowley.

KeyBank has established itself as an active and committed corporate citizen that invests in Maine, contributing both financial and volunteer resources to economic and community needs.

### Fitzsimmons Explores Rural Initiatives

Aroostook County was amongst the first stops for Maine Community College System President John Fitzsimmons, as he travels across the state to explore with focus groups of business and community leaders how Maine's community college system can further assist in strengthening Maine's rural economy. A session was held at NMCC on July 20.

The goal: to learn from local leaders about the workforce and educational challenges of their region and to identify ways in which the state's seven community colleges can play a greater role in helping to address those challenges.

In announcing the initiative, Fitzsimmons noted that more than a half million people live in rural Maine and that an estimated 12.2 percent of rural households live below the poverty line. Between 2000 and 2005, Maine saw the largest percentage increase in rural child poverty of any state in the nation. According to 2005 U.S. Census data, 22.4 percent of rural Maine children under 18 live in poverty.

"Steady job losses in traditional manufacturing and natural resource based industries have contributed to poverty and unemployment in many rural areas of the state," Fitzsimmons noted. "The economic and educational gaps between our urban and rural communities are deeply troubling. Without focused intervention they are likely to continue to grow. We need to explore how Maine's community colleges—working in partnership with local businesses and communities—can do more to strengthen and sustain rural areas of Maine."

Maine's community colleges are uniquely situated to help address some of the major workforce challenges confronting rural parts of the state. The seven colleges and their nine off-campus centers are located within 25 miles of 92 percent of Maine's population. Their programs of study are the most affordable in the state. And both their credit and non-credit offerings are focused on creating a skilled labor force that is responsive to the changing needs of the Maine economy.

Fitzsimmons will hold meetings in all 16 Maine counties. By late fall, he intends to issue a report that summarizes findings from the meetings and details recommendations on how to move forward.

## **Campus Community Celebrates Service**

NMCC employees and retirees came together for a luncheon in August to honor their colleagues who have reached service milestones. Altogether, a combined 265 years of dedicated service of 17 employees was recognized. "We tra-

ditionally held this event at the end of the

academic year and decided to move it to just before the start of classes," said NMCC President Timothy Crowley. "Recognizing the members of the NMCC family who have reached important milestones of service to the College is a wonderful way to start a new school year. Time and again we hear from students, parents and alumni about how much of a difference NMCC has made in their life or the life of their child. The devotion and dedication of our employees is extraordinary and important for us to celebrate."

## Toward Excellence NMCC Library Opens Children Section; Expands Offerings

Children and employees from two area childcare centers, advisors of the Maine Community Foundation's Aroostook County Committee, and NMCC officials came together in May for an open house and inaugural story time in the new children's section of the NMCC library.

The celebration marked the official opening of a recently completed area of the library to house the College's growing collection of children's literature. The furnishings and shelving for the

section were purchased through a \$1,045 award to NMCC through MaineCF's Aroostook County Fund.

Since 2001 the NMCC library, through donations, regular book purchases and grant opportunities, has grown its collection of children's picture books and children's literature from non-existent to nearly 300 titles. The dedicated section



now houses these publications. Previously the books had been shelved alongside the library's general stacks, which are not designed to hold picture books.

The NM collection is unique in that purchased selections are either classics, such as Newberry or Caldecott prize winners, or bibliotherapy books. Bibliotherapy or issue books are designed to be used by parents or other caregivers with children who are experiencing stress. These issues include divorce, bullying, nontraditional families, death and/or disease.

The need for children's literature and a special section to house the material at NMCC was first identified in 2000, when the College expanded its offerings to include an associate degree program in early childhood education.

"The availability of high quality children's literature in a child-friendly and literacy-centered environment is exactly what the students are learning to create – what a great model and resource for our students. The community will have the benefit of the facility and materials and our students will have the opportunity to work

with the children and materials as an embedded component of the program," said Heidi Broad-Smith, NMCC early childhood education instructor.

Aside from the benefit to ECE students and local childcare facilities, the collection is also heavily used by parents and grandparents in the NMCC community who have young children. The student body is comprised of a significant number of non-traditional students, an estimated 26 percent of whom have children.





### NMCC Event Lauded Nationally as "Good Idea"

An event for NMCC students held last academic year on the campus was lauded by an industry publication for career counselors as a "good idea."

How to Lose a Job in 10 Days, a luncheon session sponsored and coordinated by NMCC's TRiO Student Support Services program, involved a panel of Aroostook County human resource professionals who shared their horror and humorous stories to help students and prospective employers know what not to do in a job interview or on their first days on the job.

The unique angle and title of the workshop caught the attention of the editor of the *Campus Career Counselor*, a publication mailed to career service professionals nationwide. The newsletter featured a story on the NMCC offering in a section entitled "Good Ideas." "I was thrilled when I received an email from the editor who picked up the story from a news release put out by the College," said Shelli Cronkhite, NMCC counselor and workshop coordinator.

Cronkhite is a member of the local Northeast Society of Human Resource Managers (NESHRM), a local group comprised of individuals responsible for making hiring recommendations and decisions at several area businesses. Members of the organization served on the panel and shared some of their experiences with the NMCC students.

"It's very exciting that NMCC and NESHRM are being recognized nationally. Sometimes it feels like we're very isolated in northern Maine – it's nice to let people know that there are unique and exciting things happening here," said Cronkhite. New Year, from pg. 1

"This was an area identified by both our employees and our students as needing attention," said Jason Parent, director of development and college relations, who is coordinating the information window services. "We engaged the campus last semester to get a consensus on what changes were needed and what would work best. We were then able to take action this summer, thanks primarily to a great deal of work from the College's IT, maintenance and custodial staffs." Parent also credits the financial aid staff in assisting to recruit workers to staff the information window.

So far, the service is working as intended, with many stopping by for directions and other requests for assistance.
