# New Faculty & Staff Join NMCC

Three new faces have joined the fulltime faculty at NMCC to fill vacant positions in the trade and technical occupations, nursing and allied health, and business technology departments.

Todd Maynard of Fort Fairfield has been selected to serve as the new electrical con-

struction and maintenance instructor. Since 1998, Maynard had worked at Maine Public Service Company, most recently as a lead worker responsible for installation and troubleshooting



of distribution and transmission circuits. During his tenure at MPS, Maynard successfully completed a lineman apprenticeship program.

He has previously served as the electrical and instrument technician in charge of electrical and instrumentation installation, maintenance, calibration and repair while on shift at Huber Engineered Woods in Easton; as an electrical foreman at Zern Nepco Cogeneration Plant in Ashland; and as an electrical technician for Cianbro at the Maine Yankee Nuclear Power Plant in Wiscasset.

Maynard, who is a State of Maine Master Electrician, is an alumnus of NMCC, graduating with an associate degree in electrical construction and maintenance in 1990. He also earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business and technology from Husson University in 2007.

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## NMCC Welcomes Largest Incoming Class

Northern Maine Community College welcomed what is likely the largest incoming class in the institution's 48-year history as the fall semester began on August 24. While numbers were still fluctuating during the add/drop period and the start up of off-campus classes, it is estimated that enrollment jumped about 11.5 percent over last year. The number of students in the entering class on the first day of the fall semester this year (623) is up 18.9 percent over last year (524).

"The increase in our enrollment for the 2009-2010 academic year is related to several factors," said NMCC President Timothy Crowley. "Our efforts to reach out to the northern and southern regions in Aroostook County through expanded course and program offerings at our centers in Houlton and the St. John Valley, and new programs added to our academic inventory over the past few years that have directly responded to the demands of the region are key to our growth. In addition, the cost and quality of the education we offer is drawing students from greater distances, while increasing the number of students coming to us from the local area."

The College began delivery of its nursing and early childhood education programs in the St. John Valley with the start of the fall semester. Nursing courses originating on the Presque Isle campus are delivered, via videoconference, to a classroom at Madawaska High School. The clinical component of the program will be offered on-site at healthcare facilities in the region. The entire early childhood education curriculum will be taught on-site in the Valley. Students enjoyed a free Welcome breakfast courtesy of the Student Senate.

According to Crowley, academic programs added on the NMCC campus in recent years have also driven numbers up this fall. The new offerings are now at or reaching capacity in the first year of the two-year programs.

Among the top enrolled of the new offerings on campus is the wind power technology, which is the first of its kind in New England. The intention, at the time the program was announced a year ago, was to enroll a co-hort of 18 students in the inaugural class this fall. After demand for the program far exceeded capacity, College officials added a second group, so 36 students began the program this fall. NMCC received 58 qualified applications from prospective students throughout Maine and beyond for entry into the program.

"Immigration, same sex marriage and ethnicity makes it imperative that we all understand how our rights to freedom of speech can collide with rights of others," said Grieco.

Students Shannon Smart of New Sweden and Dusty Graham of Mapleton are organizing the event. "We believe it is important for our fellow students to be aware of our constitution and freedoms that our government offers versus countries in other parts of the world. It's also important for us to start teaching the next generation and generation after about the importance of the constitution that was put together to establish the nation's government," said Smart.

Light refreshments in theme of the Constitution will be offered following the presentation. Staff from the College's food services, Aramark, will also be preparing a special luncheon in the dining commons that day in keeping with the Constitution Day theme.

The College is sponsoring a test your Constitution IQ challenge. In 2004, the law establishing Constitution Day was enacted. The act mandates that all publicly funded educational institutions provide educational programming on the history of the American Constitution on that day.

## NMCC Library Establishes Maine Authors Collection Through Generosity of the Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation

More than 200 titles written by Maine authors are being added to the holdings of the E. Perrin Edmunds Library at NMCC through a \$6,000 grant from the Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation.

"Our goal was to establish a Maine collection for the Library, which will serve to encourage reading of Maine authors, study of Maine history and culture, and interest in Maine's Native American cultures," said Gail Roy, NMCC assistant dean of learning resources.

Titles by Maine authors were purchased from a number of publishers including University of Maine Press, Maine Historical Society, Maine Folklife Center, among others.

"The addition of Maine children's books, Maine history, Maine literature and poetry, and Maine Native American, and Acadian titles in this new collection will support the curricula in history, English, and early childhood education programs at the college. This collection will also be available to members of our community and to local schools," said Roy. "We are extremely grateful for the generosity of the Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation in supporting our

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## NMCC Library to Offer "Let's Talk About It" Reading Series

Members of the campus and local community are invited to join in the "Let's Talk About It" book group, a free reading and discussion series that will run from mid-September through early November in the NMCC library.

NMCC was selected by the Maine Humanities Council to offer "Let's Talk About It," which, this fall, will focus on the theme "Defining Wilderness: Defining Maine." The series, developed for the Humanities Council by historian Candace Kanes, examines the Maine wilderness, how various people have experienced it and written about it, and how those accounts have influenced Maine and shaped its identity.

"Northern Maine is the ideal location to explore the concept of wilderness and the various perspectives from several authors. We are grateful to the MHC and look forward to hosting this reading series," said Gail Roy, NMCC assistant dean of learning resources and coordinator of the local group. "Through 'Let's Talk About It' we will discuss what constitutes the wilderness, the relationship between humans and the natural environment, about conservation and ecology, and not least about our personal relationship to the wilderness."

According to Roy, five sessions will be held as part of the series in which participants will discuss a different book each time. All five books are available through the NMCC library. Interested participants can stop by the library during regular business hours to pick up the books.

The opening session for the "Let's Talk About It" book group will be held on Monday, September 14, at 6:00 p.m. David Raymond, NMCC humanities instructor, will lead the discussion on Henry David Thoreau's *The Maine Woods*.


The second session, which will be led by Jennifer Graham, NMCC English instructor, will take place on Thursday, October 8, at 12:00 noon. Participants will have read and discuss *The Wilderness from Chamberlain Farm: A Story of Hope for the American Wild* by Dean Bennett.

Fly Rod Crosby: the Woman Who Marketed Maine by Julia A. Hunter and Earle G Shettleworth, Jr. will be the featured text for discussion at the third meeting in the series, which will be held on Friday, October 16, at 10:00 a.m., and will be led by Misty Robinson, NMCC graduate, and Roy.

The final two sessions will be held on Tuesday, October 27, and Monday, November 9, both at 12:00 noon. The October 27 discussion will be led by area forester Tim Scott and will focus on the book *Campfires Rekindled* by George S. Kephart. The November 9 discussion will be led by Jan Greico, NMCC English instructor, and will center on the book *We Took to the Woods* by Louise Dickinson Rich.

"Exploring ideas and issues through literature has always been exciting and fun," said Lizz Sinclair, director of "Let's Talk About It." "We find that there is a great interest among adults in getting together to discuss what they've read with others. Having discussion leaders at Northern Maine Community College who are both excited about the readings and skilled in facilitating can help deepen the experience."

Interested community members are encouraged to call the library at 768-2734 to register and come in to pick up the first book of the series. The library is open Monday through Thursday from 7:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and Friday from 7:30 a.m. through 4:30 p.m.

tor, enrollment in the incoming class of the medical assisting and medical coding programs has more than doubled this fall over last. Significant growth has also been realized in the relatively new precision metals manufacturing program, one of 12 academic offerings under the College's trade and technical occupations department.

Many of the trades related courses are realizing record numbers this fall as area displaced workers are turning to NMCC for education and training for new careers as a result of the economic downturn. The College launched an unprecedented new semester in March to accommodate those laid off. More than 40 unemployed workers from the Fraser Timberlands Mill in Ashland took advantage of the session.

"Our willingness to offer programs and courses when needed has been very well received – not only by the students – but by people and policy makers across Maine. The March special semester helped unemployed workers transition into the College, engaged these individuals and provided a springboard for the coming fall semester," said Crowley.

Aside from larger numbers of nontraditional students, the College has also seen a significant increase in the number of traditional-aged students. The number of 17 through 24 year olds in the entering class of 2009 is 14.5 percent greater than the incoming class of 2008. Included in that number is one of every eight students graduating this past June from high schools in Aroostook County.

Accommodating the record numbers presents a unique set of challenges according to Crowley, especially since the College is coming off a year that saw its budget reduced through a curtailment order by \$400,000.

"The College is being stretched to respond to this demand—a demand created by a team effort in enrollment management, new programs that attract students, high quality instruction and services at a reasonable cost, as well as our commitment to the County to respond when we are called upon," said Crowley. "In a year when we have reduced our budget by a significant amount, we are serving what is likely the largest entering class ever. It is a tribute to the willingness of the faculty and staff to step up to this challenge that has allowed us to provide the education people are looking for."

## NMCC Seeking Nominations to Northern Maine Construction Hall of Fame

Nominations are being sought from the community for individuals who have made a significant impact on the construction industry in the region for the 2009 induction into the Northern Maine Construction Hall of Fame.

The Hall of Fame was officially opened, and the first five honorees inducted, on the NMCC campus in October of 2008 during National Careers in Construction Week. Last fall three individuals were added to the Hall of Fame. This year's ceremony will again take place during the week set aside to honor construction workers, which falls between October 12 - 16.

"The concept of creating a 'Hall of Fame' to recognize key individuals who have contributed both to the profession and as mentors to others entering the profession, provides an ideal opportunity to honor the legacy of these individuals and is reflective of the teaching and learning that happens in our programs and across the NMCC campus each and every day.

The wall of honor featuring the inductee photos is located inside the main entrance of the Mailman Trades Building in the corridor that students, faculty, staff and visitors use to enter and exit the building daily. According to McDougal, the space is ideal, because students and prospective students of the college regularly have the opportunity to see the faces and learn the stories of some of the "legends" in the construction trades, and in turn better understand that similar career success is possible for them.

The inductees honored to date represent prominent construction business owners and industry leaders, as well as alumni and retired faculty of NMCC.

## Library to Host Discussion on 'Bloodlesss Aroostook War'

Living so close to the border between Maine and New Brunswick, Canada, most of us have never given it much thought... well, that is, until the recent law requiring passports to cross the border. A key part of our heritage that many may not be familiar with is the "Bloodless Aroostook War" that settled the location of that border back in 1842.

Well, now is the chance to remedy that. The 'Bloodless Aroostook War' will be the topic of discussion during a presentation by Dr. Dena Winslow in the NMCC library on Wednesday, September 16, from 12:00 - 1:00 p.m.

Winslow was given access to the original papers, letters and documents of the Commander in Chief during that conflict, Commander Isaac Hodsdon. Included in these documents was a lot of information not previously known about this war, information that she will be sharing. In addition, Winslow will give us a look at what sort of a man the Commander was, and she will discuss some of the myths surrounding this "bloodless" war. Winslow, who is the executive director of Workforce Investment Board for Aroostook and Washington Counties, has a rich history with the County. Born in Caribou, she was raised on a dairy and potato farm in Mapleton. Now living in Presque Isle, she is a hot air balloon pilot, getting a birds-eye view of the County. She built her own hot air balloon in 1998.

After graduating from Presque Isle High School, she went on to earn her Bachelor of Science degree in English, Speech and Theatre from UMPI in 1975. In 1988, she completed her Master of Education degree in Educational Leadership at the University of Southern Maine. In 2000, she earned her Ph.D. in History at the University of Maine.

Winslow taught high school for many years and was selected Maine Teacher of the Year in 1989 by the IBM Corporation. She has also taught at the University level for several years. She is the author of *They Lynched Jim Cullen: New England's Only Lynching* and *1880-1980: Mapleton, Maine.* 

## Photographer Terry Kilcollins Displays Work at NMCC Library

"All of the photos I take have sentimental value. They're never random," says photographer Terry Kilcollins of her work. It is her love of nature coupled with her passion for photography that inspired Kilcollins, as an adult, to leave the educa-



tion profession she had worked in for two decades and finish working on her photography degree. In 2001, she graduated with honors from the New York Institute of Photography in New York City.

Since then, she has opened her own business, TCK Photography, and specializes in combining formal photography with nature. She presently offers photography services for weddings, families, pets, senior high school portraits, proms and commercial photography.

Kilcollins, the wife of NMCC instructor Wayne Kilcollins, has been published in *Savior* and *Echoes* magazines and has done promotional photography for new businesses and products.

lead enrollment management efforts for the College.

In addition, he developed and implemented the early child care education program at the SAD 1 facility and expanded the agriculture science



program to include an apple cider processing lab at the school farm.

Prior to PIRCTC, McCluskey served for eight years as the tech prep coordinator for the Northern and Eastern Maine Tech Prep Consortium based at NMCC. He was responsible for

providing services to the faculty, staff and administration of 30 high schools, seven technology centers, two technical colleges and four campuses of the University of Maine System.

McCluskey coordinated the development of articulation models that enabled and encouraged high school students to go on to college. Those models were later recognized and cited for replication at both the state and national level. More than 100 agreements were developed between secondary schools in northern Maine and NMCC. Before his work with the tech prep iniative, he spent 25 years as a classroom technology teacher in the Presque Isle and Biddeford school systems.

## Retiree Donates Collection of Newspapers Chronicling Major Moments in U.S. History

Harold Quass, a former faculty member in the College's automotive technology program for more than two decades, recently made a generous donation to the library. Quass was the second-ever instructor hired by then Northeastern Maine Vocational Institute when it opened in 1963.

The 93-year-old was cleaning out a closet in his home when he came across a cardboard box with a typewritten index card neatly labeled "keepsake newspapers." It was a box packaged by his late wife Dorothy before her death in January 2002, and enclosed was a collection of two dozen well-preserved newspapers from key moments in U.S. history dating back to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Quass thought of NMCC – a place where they would be preserved and available for future generations to appreciate. "I've got a great love for this place and it was the first place I thought of when I realized what I had found," said Quass in presenting the collection to Gail Roy, NMCC's assistant dean of learning resources. "The events chronicled in these newspapers in my lifetime unfolded while I was here at the college. I remember a student coming into my classroom to tell me that the President (Kennedy) had been shot."

Indeed, the collection of papers, which extend from November 23, 1963 through November 7, 1984, begin with Bangor Daily News editions covering the assassination of Kennedy and the immediate aftermath.

In addition to the original editions of the Bangor Daily News, some of the other papers in the collection chronicling the major news events are the Maine Sunday Telegram and the Boston Sunday Globe. Included are editions which detail: the shooting death of Robert F. Kennedy and

**NMCC Presents Posters to P.I. Air Museum** 

The photos and stories of six "airmen of note" who had a connection to the former Presque Isle Air Base or central Aroostook County have been captured and presented on large print posters through a collaborative effort between volunteers with the Presque Isle Air Museum and students and staff at NMCC.

At a recent meeting of the P.I. Air Museum Committee, representatives of NMCC presented the group with six large posters they produced using photos and text from the museum collection provided by committee member Gary Boone. Boone researched and wrote the narratives of the men who either were natives of the Star City or made an indelible impact on the air base.

The six prints were originally created by NMCC for the Presque Isle Area Chamber of Commerce annual dinner hosted at the College earlier this year. Since NMCC sits on the site of the former air base, the dinner was themed to resemble a USO show from the World War II era and held in the College gymnasium. The posters were also displayed at NMCC when the College hosted the official 150th birthday party for the city of Presque Isle in April.

"We are so appreciative of Northern Maine Community College for the donation of the WWII posters to the museum,"

said Nathan Grass, president of the P.I. Air Museum Committee. "We also thank the College for their recognition of the history of the Presque Isle Airport, especially during the World War II time period. The College sits on the site of the former Army Hospital that treated many returning soldiers wounded during the D-Day invasion and the Battle of the Bulge. This generous donation goes a long way toward assisting our efforts to remember our servicemen and women."

The six servicemen include Colonel Rafael Baez, Jr. who served as the first

the events that followed; the Apollo Moon Landing; the impeachment and resignation of President Richard Nixon and Gerald Ford becoming the nation's 38th President, as well as his pardon of Nixon; and the freeing of the hostages at the end of the Iran Hostage crisis.

"NMCC is delighted to receive this donation for our library's archives. The newspapers will be used by students conducting research, put on display in the library for special events, and will be available for use by anyone in the community wishing to review them," said Roy. "We are very grateful that Mr. Quass thought of contacting the college and appreciate his generous donation."

commanding officer of Presque Isle Army Air Field; Colonel Gerald Evan Williams, a Presque Isle native who was one of the first in the County to graduate from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point; Captain Dana F. Dudley of Mapleton, who was among the first group of B-17 crews to fly out of North Africa; Lieutenant Richard A. Graves of Presque Isle, who served with the Royal Canadian Air Force and U.S. Army Air Corps; Sergeant Robert N. Smith of Presque Isle, a tail-gunner whose plane was shot down by the Germans and who later escaped from a prisoner of war camp; and Ernest "Bus" Loane, Jr. of Presque Isle, who enlisted in the Army Air Corps and on whose family farm the base was built.

"Working on this project has been extremely valuable in terms of us gaining a better appreciation for those who came before us, those who defended our freedom, and even those who walked on the same ground we do each day on our campus," said Jason Parent, NMCC director of development and college relations.
